PHOENIX AREA SOCIAL SURVEY II

Sample Selection of 40 Neighborhoods

Neighborhoods for the Phoenix Area Social Survey (PASS) 2006 were selected from 204 randomly chosen long-term monitoring sites in the study area of the Central Arizona-Phoenix Long-Term Ecological Research (CAP LTER) project. The CAP LTER 200-point survey, which covers 6,400 km², was conducted most recently in 2005. It is a periodic field survey designed to study vegetation, soil, and other ecological variables on 30 x 30-m sample plots distributed over all types of land uses in the study area.¹ Land use classifications of the sample plots reported in the 200-point survey indicated that 101 points were located in residential areas. After examining aerial photographs of the area surrounding the 101 points, 16 sites were visited in order to determine their suitability for inclusion in the residential sampling frame. Seven of these were eliminated because residences were not proximate to the location of the plot.

The LTER survey points are geo-referenced, which allowed us to overlay block group boundaries from the 2000 census on the 94 remaining sites. Census demographic data were assembled for those sites. The block groups were cross-classified by median household income and location into seven groups: low income core; low income suburban; middle to high income core*; middle income suburban; low to middle income fringe*, high income suburban, and high income fringe. (*Two groups were combined because there were few neighborhoods that fit the criteria.) An eighth category of retirement communities was added.

Five neighborhoods from each group (for a total of 40 neighborhoods) were selected with the objectives of creating a balanced sample of neighborhoods that would: 1) represent variation in ethnic/racial composition, homeowners and renters, and municipalities across the Phoenix metropolitan region; and 2) enable us to match spatially the PASS and 200-point survey data. In some urban fringe locations where census block groups were several times the average size of 0.25 mi², a residential area near the LTER survey plot was selected in which to sample households.

Criteria for Classifying Block Groups (Neighborhoods)

Median Annual Household Income*

Low: Under \$35,000

Middle: \$35,000 to \$70,000

High: Over \$70,000

Core, Suburban, Fringe

Core neighborhoods are within 5 miles of downtown Phoenix or within 1.5 miles of the 7 other large-city downtowns, though exact distances varied a little based on historical development patterns (e.g., some of the new developments south of Phoenix are not much more than 5 miles from downtown).

Fringe areas have a moderate amount of undeveloped land within a mile of the neighborhood in 2005. Comparing the location of PASS fringe points to the MAG Regional Report, 2005 (Map U-1), PASS fringe is in urban growth areas developed in 2000-2005.

Suburban – all others

Retirement

Median age of residents over 55; three neighborhoods are age-restricted and two are not.

Ethnicity

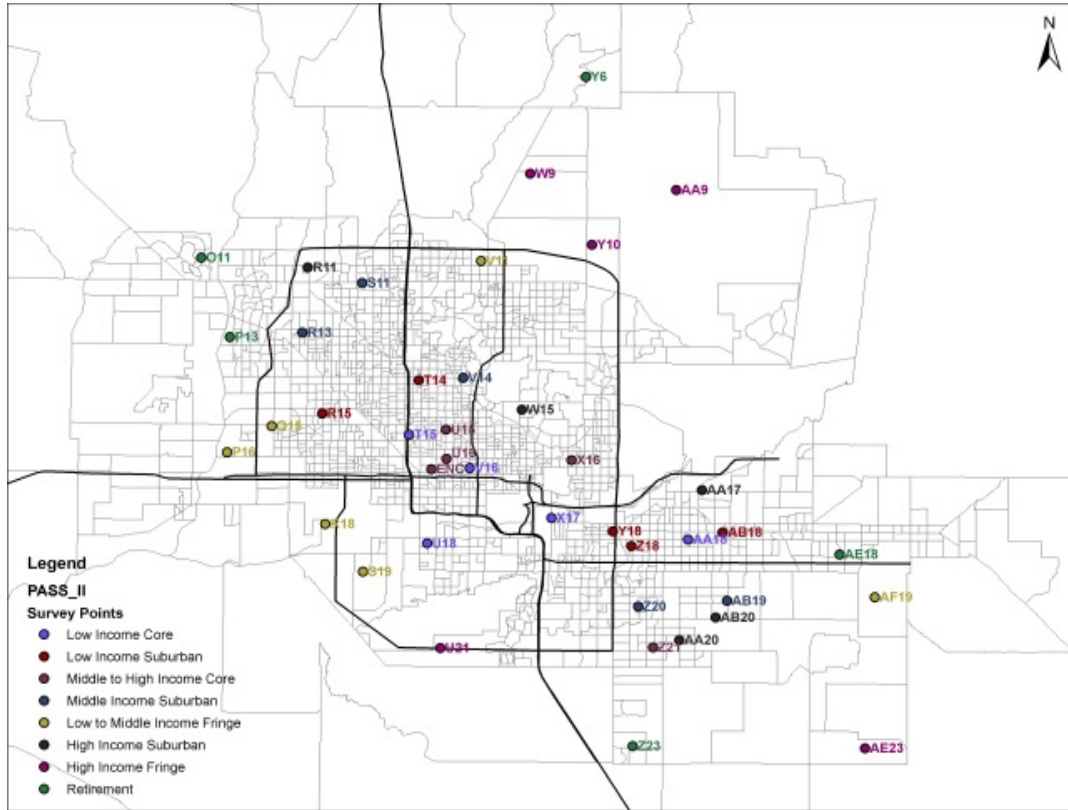

This codebook includes text of questions asked in the survey along with the values recorded for responses.

The survey was administered by the Institute for Social Science Research at Arizona State University from April 29 through September 27, 2006. Data was collected using a multi-modal approach. Below is an outline of the sampling and survey process.

1. Sample selection
 - a. 40 neighborhoods selected; n=20 in each neighborhood
 - i. GIS (Geographic Information Systems) created maps of each neighborhood from the Maricopa County Tax Assessor's records with each parcel of land noted with an APN (parcel ID) number
 - ii. Each neighborhood was canvassed to determine the accuracy of the maps. Any discrepancies were noted. (For example, a house may be listed on the map but may have been torn down.)
 1. All business were noted on the maps
 2. All apartment buildings were noted on the maps.
 - a. The number of apartments in each apartment complex and the apartment numbering were noted.
 - b. For each neighborhood, a list of eligible addresses was created from the maps and APN numbers including apartments, mobile home parks and so forth.
 - c. Using SPSS, 60 addresses were randomly selected from each neighborhood.
 - i. The first 40 addresses were used as the sample. These addresses will be referred to as "sample."
 - ii. The other 20 addresses were placed in reserve to use as replacement sample (primarily when a home was vacant) or to use if additional sample was released.
2. Pre-survey efforts
 - a. Doorknob hangers announcing that PASS was coming were placed on the doorknobs of the sample.
 - b. The following was sent to each sample:
 - i. A letter explaining the project and how to complete the survey in English and Spanish;
 - ii. A brochure with "fast facts" about the project in English and Spanish;
 - iii. A \$1 bill; and,
 - iv. A magnet that was graphically designed with PASS printed on it.
 - c. The above information (in "3") was sent out over a period of approximately 3 weeks. Information was sent by neighborhood.
 - d. A phone line dedicated to PASS was installed at the ISSR. Sample was asked to call the number where they would reach a message (in English

- and Spanish) and be asked to leave information and a time for us to call them back.
- e. Phone numbers were obtained for as many addresses as possible.
 - i. Using www.whitepages.com, addresses were entered and then phone numbers were accessed when available.
 1. We were able to find phone number of approximately 50 percent of the sample.
 2. About 25 percent of those phone numbers were inaccurate.
 3. Few phone numbers were obtained for apartments.
3. Methods of completing the survey
- a. Random selection within each household
 - i. In the letters sent to the households, the scripts interviewers read to adults who answered the phone in each household, and in instructions provided at the beginning of the web survey, households were requested to allow the head of household who most recently celebrated a birthday to complete the survey.
 - b. Language
 - i. All correspondence was provided in English and Spanish;
 - ii. All survey methods (online, phone and in-person) were provided in English and Spanish.
 - c. Online
 - i. A simple URL address was provided where the survey could be accessed online
 1. <http://issr.asu.edu/pass>
 - ii. Each sample was provided a unique login ID and password that the respondent had to enter to log onto the survey.
 1. The login ID and password were connected to the address
 - a. When an individual accessed the website, s/he had to enter the logon ID and password.
 - b. The computer called up with address associated with that login ID and password.
 - c. The respondent had to confirm the address before proceeding.
 - d. Telephone
 - i. Telephone interviewers called numbers provided through the phone number search (see “2e” above) and asked to conduct the interview at that time or to set up an appointment.
 - ii. Interviewers called each phone number a maximum of 20 times unless the respondent insisted s/he did not want to complete the survey.
 - iii. Interviewers also called appointments made through the hotline.
 - e. In person
 - i. Sample could request an in-person interview.
 - ii. Interviewers went to the addresses of households in the sample that had not completed the survey after the survey had been in the field for approximately 2.5 months.

1. English and Spanish-speaking interviewers went to each sample address where no one had completed the survey and did one or more of the following:
 - a. Conducted the interview at that time;
 - i. Interviewers took laptops with them so that they could access the questionnaire and record the responses.
 - b. Left a flier (prepared in English and Spanish);
 - c. Provided a card with the URL and the sample's login ID and password (in English and Spanish);
 - d. Obtained a phone number; and/or,
 - e. Obtained an appointment for an interview.
4. Follow up for non-response
 - a. Letters and/or postcards were sent periodically to each address that had not completed the survey (except for individuals who specifically requested us not to contact them) asking them to take it, reminding them of how to take it (online, phone, etc.), and providing their login ID and password.
 - b. Interviewers left messages on voice mail or answering machines asking sample to take the survey and providing basic information on the methods.
 - c. Interviewers visited the addresses of non-respondents (see "3e" above).
5. Incentive
 - a. Initially, a \$20 incentive was offered for individuals who completed the survey.
 - b. In mid-July, the incentive was increased to \$50 to help obtain responses.

Response rate

1,584 pieces of valid sample were used. From the valid sample, 808 completed surveys were obtained resulting in a response rate of 51 percent.

Additionally, sample usage was monitored by neighborhood. In every neighborhood, a minimum response rate of 50 percent was obtained.

Phone and web surveys

Both of these modes used a software system called WinCati which is produced by Sawtooth Technologies.
